5. What happens to criminal charge (s) if a person has an intellectual disability? When a person first appears in court they can represent themselves, see the duty lawyer, apply for legal aid or pay for a lawyer. If intellectual disability is relevant to the charges, they should speak to a lawyer. In Queensland, a person's criminal charges can be dismissed or discontinued if the Court agrees that the person was of unsound mind at the time of the offences or is currently unfit for trial.
